

## Willhommen (Welcome)

#### Camp Springs is located ten miles southeast of Cincinnati. Ohio. Welcome to the 10th annual tour. For the

past nine years we have been welcoming visitors from near and far to behold the beauty of our historic valley on the third Sunday in October.

Beginning in the middle of the 19th century a small group of German immigrants settled in what is now Camp Springs. Emigrating from wine districts in Germany, they established hillside farms and vineyards using stones to build many homes and various structures. In the early days, this area in Campbell County was called Hayfield or Indian Springs.

At one point Camp Springs was part of a small geographic area that produced one third of the wine in the United States. The hillside vineyards in Camp Springs contributed to nearly 10% of Kentucky's total wine output at it's height. Unfortunately by the end of the 19th Century, blight had destroyed most of these vineyards, and the German immigration had ended.

After the vineyards were destroyed by blight, orchards and vegetable products became the chief agricultural staples of the area. Subsequently, brick and wood became the choice for farm building and houses, abandoning the once popular stone. Dwellings, taverns, churches and farm complexes contribute to the unique quality of the German settlement in this tiny community. The work of devoted German immigrants left its mark forever in the hills and stone houses of Camp Springs.

Many decedents of the original settlers still reside in the valley. Vineyards and wineries are making a resurgence, keeping agriculture at the heart of the





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
