

### **Visit Camp Springs**

Twenty sites featured in Second Annual Herbst (Autumn) Tour

A tour along the stonehouse trail in Camp Springs is coming to Camp Springs, Ky.; Sunday, October 19, Noon to 5 p.m. Herbst, German meaning autumn, reflects the German heritage of this historic rural community.

The tour last year welcomed hundreds of visitors at each location who thrilled at the beauty and tranquility of the area which residents enjoy. Many inquired about the area's history wishing to visit the churches with ancestor's roots.

The four area churches will participate this year as well as the Camp Springs Fire Department all rich in history in this area long ago established by German immigrants. All will offer tours of the buildings, historical photos and documents. Refreshments will be available at each location.

The self guided tour features twenty locations including three working farms, a horse farm, six stone houses, two vineyards, a winery, four artist studios, a bed and breakfast, and equestrian center. The tour is open free to the public.

#### Stonehouse Trails

When I was a young girl playing softball at the Camp Springs ball field, I used to ride my pony to practice We lived up on Fender Road, so usually I would come down Fender to Four and Twelve Mile (now Stonehouse Road) and then turn right on Four Mile Pike.

A short 25 years later, riding down Four Mile Pike would not be such a leisure stroll. The road is now mostly only a thoroughfare for many people. Dodging the fast and impatient cars would be stressful and dangerous.

As deep as those memories are, I still long to ride the beautiful woods and hills of my home, Camp Springs. You have only to walk through some of these farms with hundred year old forests to truly enjoy living in Camp Springs.

We are so blessed that we live in a park like setting. Our farms and woods are as beautiful and interesting as any park I have ridden in these United States.

#### Where are the Trails?

Here's a recap of what has been going on and a little about what we have to do:

- 2006 The idea for a trail system in Camp Springs was conceived:
  - To showcase our beautiful stone houses.
  - To provide a SAFE place in our community to walk and ride.
  - To help Camp Springs family businesses increase sales
  - To show off our beautiful area of the community
- The Camp Springs Trail System is the only known trail system that totally resides on Private Land – a first!
- Application for a \$100,000 grant with the Governor's Office for Local Development (GOLD) was received in November, 2007.
- We supported legislation protecting private property owners from liability when allowing public recreation on their lands. Allied with horse associations across the state, horse related activities were included. Rallies in Frankfort, petitions, and contact with State Representatives and Senators helped pass this law in April, 2008.
- We created a lease agreement to protect property owners and protect the trail investment.
- Educational meetings with County and City officials obtained their support.
- Researching, creating and pushing a county wide ordinance for a trait Tag system what would be the means for enforcing the rules of the Trail System.
- Currently preparing documentation to establish a trailhead.
- Next step: Sign-up land owners who wants to be included? So many points of interest in Historic Camp Springs – Farms, Green Houses, Stone Houses, Vineyards, Wineries, Artists, Ohio River, Creek, Cemeteries, Churches – what/who did I leave out? Join the CSI Trails Committee – let's make it happen.
